Comments and questions were offered by Commissioners Ward, Orth, Rosenberg, and Brown. The Commission directed staff to address Commissioner comments and edit suggestions to the workshop draft and bring to Public Hearing with the full Fire District SOI Update document at the April 2, 2018 Regular Meeting.

Items for staff to address:

It was noted that some suggestions refer to the previously adopted MSR rather than the current SOI Update and staff will evaluate those items for appropriate updating and notation for the next MSR update.

- ° Pg 1-2: Verify the history of the District, including year of formation, name changes, etc.
- Pg 1-3 1.2.1.3: Evaluate possible mutual aid agreements with Lake County Fire Districts, verify Federal areas of responsibility. It was noted that the Mendocino County Association of Fire Districts is considering coordination with for Emergency Medical Services cooperation with Lake County.

A complete Public Hearing Draft is scheduled to be available two weeks prior to the April 2, 2018 Public Hearing and a map of all Fire Districts will be included.

#### 6f) Preliminary Draft Budget and Work Plan for Fiscal Year 2018-19 (Video Time 49:30)

EO Hinman presented the draft budget, noting the Executive Committee has reviewed and recommends the proposed preliminary budget for discussion.

EO Hinman reviewed the process for adoption of the budget as follows:

- 1. A Public Hearing Notice for the Proposed Budget will be published, notice distributed to the Special Districts, Cities, and County, and held on April 2, 2018.
- 2. A Public Hearing Notice for the Final Budget will be published, notice distributed to the Special Districts, Cities, and County, and held in May or June 2018.

EO Hinman noted changes from the previous fiscal year budget total is \$11,455 less and reviewed the specific changes as described in the staff report. Additionally, the following points were highlighted:

- ° CEQA costs are not included in the budgeted work plan amount. It was recommended funds be identified to cover anticipated CEQA costs.
- Proposed Tasks for Consideration as outlined in staff report: items that would benefit LAFCo operations and require additional funding.
- <sup>o</sup> Budgets over the last few years have been balanced by spending down reserves. Proposed operating revenue options were presented.
- ° The presented work plan is an estimate only of time and costs. It will be reviewed annually.

Comments and questions were offered by Commissioners Ward, McCowen, McNerlin, Brown, Orth, and Doble. Discussion was held on the following topics:

- <sup>°</sup> Records retention, electronic recording of historical documents
- <sup>o</sup> Proposed Potential State Funding Opportunity for consolidations.
- <sup>°</sup> Training opportunities in cooperation with County Counsel.
- ° Enhance outreach to Special Districts.
- ° Transparency Action Plan election costs.
- ° Apportionment fee adjustments.

The Commission directed staff to add \$1,500 drawn from operational reserves to fund the potential state funding opportunities task and any other adjustments consistent with that direction to the proposed budget and notice it for Public Hearing at the April 2, 2018 Regular Commission Meeting.

#### Modification of Current Contract RE: Subcontracting

Comments and questions were offered by Commissioners Doble, McCowen, and Brown. It was suggested that the intent is for any subcontracting to be funded from the Executive Officer contracted and budgeted amount should be stated clearly in contract. It was also suggested to include the proposed stricken section regarding contracting on behalf or in the name of the other party. Legal Counsel suggested wording for an additional item.

#### Termination Clause to New Executive Officer Services Agreement

The proposal of six month written notice of termination to Executive Officer from Commission was discussed, with the suggestion of shortening the length. Commission consensus was to retain the proposed six month notice and Legal counsel noted the inclusion of a provision for short term release for cause. The Commission requested wordsmithing to clarify the clause.

Upon motion by Commissioner Doble and second by Commissioner Gonzalez, the authorization of the LAFCo Chair to sign the proposed Executive Officer Contract Amendment No. 1 to the agreement with Hinman & Associates dated July 1, 2016 with the edits as shown below and the authorization of the LAFCo Chair to sign the proposed Executive Officer Contract Agreement with Hinman & Associates which expires June 30, 2018 with the edit as shown below was approved by roll call vote:

Contract Amendment No. 1 changes:

- 17e. Any subcontracting should be paid out of contractor funds and not out of LAFCo funds unless otherwise agreed.
- ° 17f. Neither part shall, on the basis of this Agreement, contract on behalf of or in the name of the other party. Any agreement that violates this Section shall confer no rights on any party and shall be null and void.

#### Recommendation

Adopt Resolution 17-18-06, approving the Proposed Budget and Work Plan for Fiscal Year 2018-2019, and direct the Executive Officer to notice a public hearing for the Final Budget and Work Plan for FY 2018-19 for May 7, 2018.

#### Discussion

The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 mandates operating costs for Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCos) shall be annually funded by the affected counties, cities, and independent special districts on a one-third apportionment basis. Apportionments for cities and independent special districts are further divided and proportional to each agency's total revenues as a percentage of the overall revenue amount collected in the county. LAFCos are also authorized to establish and collect fees to offset agency contributions.

At the March 5, 2018 regular meeting of the Commission, a workshop on the Preliminary Budget and Work Plan for FY 2018-19 was held. The Commission provided direction to staff to distribute the approved Draft Proposed Budget to member agencies for review and to notice the Proposed Budget for hearing on April 2, 2018. The Commission reviewed changes to operating expenses that will be funded through the use of the unused funds from FY 2017-18, Operating Reserves, as needed. The Proposed Budget is included as Attachment 1.

#### Proposed Operating Expenses

The proposed operating expenses for FY 2018-19 are \$150,270 and reflect the anticipated staffing services for day-to-day operations and for conducting MSR/SOIs scheduled for FY 2018-19 (Attachment 1). The proposed expenses are approximately \$10,000 less than the FY 2017-18 budget. The projected changes from the adopted FY 2017-18 budget are summarized below:

#### Proposed Operating Revenues

The proposed expenses require increasing apportionment fees to \$135,000, utilizing operational fund balance rollover, and approximately \$7,120 of reserves to balance the budget.

As of February 28, 2018, the available operational fund balance was \$63,970. It is anticipated that expenses for the remainder of FY 2017-18 will be approximately \$55,820, leaving an anticipated cash balance of approximately \$8,150 to roll into next FY. The estimated cash balance consists primarily of unexpended funds allocated for Conferences (Account 6800), Travel & Lodging (Account 6750), A-87 Costs County Services (Account 6400), and Office Expenses (Account 5600).

#### <u>Reserves</u>

During the past three years, apportionment fees were lowered in order to utilize excess reserves that had accumulated, primarily from work plan delays in previous years. The excess reserves have been expended and the Proposed Budget for FY 2018-19 will result in a year-end operational reserve balance approximately \$4,400 below the target established in Mendocino LAFCo policy, which is a legal reserve of \$50,000 and operational reserves of 25% of operating costs. The Proposed Budget will require use of approximately \$7,120 from operational reserves, which will lower the operational reserves to approximately \$33,174.



SUBJECT: **Public Hearing** to Consider Adoption of a Resolution Approving the Multi-District Fire Protection Services Sphere of Influence Update

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

- (1) Find the Multi-District Fire Protection Services Sphere of Influence Update is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Title 14 California Code of Regulations §15061(b)(3) and approve the Notice of Exemption for filing; and
- (2) Adopt LAFCo Resolution 17-18-07, approving the Multi-District Fire Protection Services Sphere of Influence Update and affirming the existing sphere of influence for eleven special districts providing fire protection services and amending the existing sphere of influence for Leggett Valley Fire Protection District (FPD) and Elk Community Services District (CSD).

#### **DISCUSSION**

This is a public hearing to consider public testimony and proposed adoption of the Multi-District Fire Protection Services Sphere of Influence Update (SOI) Update. The Commission held six Workshops for thirteen special districts providing fire protection services (refer to the table below), provided comments and requested revisions, and directed staff to notice the matter for Public Hearing on April 2, 2018.

During the March 5, 2018 Workshop, the Commission noted that some suggestions refer to the previously adopted Municipal Service Review (MSR) rather than the current SOI Update and will be addressed in the next MSR/SOI Update process. Staff has revised the Workshop Drafts to address the Commission's comments, where possible, and consolidated the thirteen SOI Updates into one document, attached for consideration. The Public Notice was mailed to each district on February 8, 2018 and published in the Ukiah Daily Journal and Fort Bragg Advocate News according to the attached proof of publications.

The Multi-District Fire Protection Services MSR was adopted by the Commission on April 4, 2016. This SOI Update includes informational updates to the MSR that support the SOI analysis, recommendation, and determinations. Staff has worked with each district to receive feedback on the Workshop Draft SOI Update and each district has confirmed support for the SOI recommendation.

Note that staff received information from Redwood Valley-Calpella Fire District after the posting of the Draft Multi-District Fire Protection Services Sphere of Influence Update, clarifying the correct name of the district does not include "Protection." Staff will make the change in the final document.

The SOI Update recommends the Commission affirm the existing SOI for eleven districts and amend the existing SOI for Leggett Valley FPD and Elk CSD. The Leggett Valley SOI is recommended to be reduced to remove the 1993 one-half mile SOI buffer on either side of the US Highway 101 corridor and to establish a coterminous SOI with the District boundary. The Elk SOI is recommended to be expanded to add two areas containing 13 parcels that have the potential for a change in ownership from a timber production company and development of structures, are only accessible from the district boundary, and to which the district is the first responder.

### Approving Adoption of the Multi-District Fire Protection Services Sphere of Influence (SOI) Update

WHEREAS, the Mendocino Local Agency Formation Commission, hereinafter referred to as the "Commission", is authorized to conduct municipal service reviews and establish, amend, and update spheres of influence for local governmental agencies whose jurisdictions are within Mendocino County; and

WHEREAS, on April 4, 2016, the Commission adopted the Multi-District Fire Protection Services Municipal Service Review to evaluate thirteen special districts providing fire protection services in Mendocino County (LAFCo Resolution No. 15-16-18) pursuant to California Government Code Section 56430; and

WHEREAS, the Commission conducted a sphere of influence update for thirteen special districts providing fire protection services in Mendocino County pursuant to California Government Code Section 56425; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer gave sufficient notice of a public hearing to be conducted by the Commission in the form and manner prescribed by law; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer's report and recommendations on the sphere of influence update were presented to the Commission in the manner provided by law; and

WHEREAS, the Commission heard and fully considered all the evidence presented at a public hearing held on the sphere of influence update on April 2, 2018; and

WHEREAS, the Commission considered all the factors required under California Government Code Section 56425.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Mendocino Local Agency Formation Commission does hereby RESOLVE, DETERMINE, and ORDER as follows:

- 1. The Commission, as Lead Agency, finds the sphere of influence update is exempt from further review under the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Title 14 California Code of Regulations §15061(b)(3). This finding is based on the Commission determining with certainty the update will have no possibility of significantly effecting the environment given that this update does not grant new land use entitlements, changes to the physical environment, or municipal service powers.
- 2. This sphere of influence update is assigned the following distinctive short-term designation: "Multi-District Fire Protection Services SOI Update"
- 3. Pursuant to Government Code Section 56425(e), the Commission makes the written statement of determinations included in the sphere of influence update, hereby incorporated by reference.

4. The Executive Officer shall revise the official records of the Commission to reflect this update of the sphere of influence for the thirteen special districts providing fire protection services in Mendocino County listed below.

SUBJECT: CALAFCO Calls for Legislative Action

#### Recommendation

Direct the Chair to sign the attached letters of support for AB 2600 (Flora) and AB 2491 (Cooley).

#### Discussion

#### AB 2600 (Flora)

This bill adds the option for local governments to adopt a resolution of application in lieu of the 5,000 signature petition to initiate the formation of a Regional Park & Open Space District. Current law only allows the initiation to occur by a petition of 5,000 or more voters. This restrictive initiation requirement is an antiquated feature of the Open Space District law which was passed in 1939 and has not undergone a comprehensive update since. The petition requirement increases the cost and time for proponents to initiate Regional Park and Open Space District formation proposals. The principal acts for a variety of special districts allow initiation by either petition or local agency resolution, including Cemetery Districts, Community Service Districts, Fire Protection Districts, Mosquito and Vector Abatement Districts, and Parks and Recreation Districts.

CALAFCO supports the availability of a more streamlined and less costly initiation process for Regional Park and Open Space Districts. Adding the option for local governments to adopt a resolution of application in lieu of the 5,000 signature petition is a much more streamlined way to initiate the formation process. Further, keeping the LAFCo application process intact also allows for the appropriate detailed review to ensure the efficient and sustainable provision of services.

#### AB 2491 (Cooley)

This bill (sponsored by the League) seeks to reinstate Vehicle License Fee (VLF) funding (through Education Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF), which will be backfilled by the general fund) for future city incorporations. The VLF gap created by SB 89, created a financial disincentive for future city incorporations and annexations of inhabited territory. For the past seven years, no new cities have formed. Given the growing population in our state and the need for orderly growth and adequate service provision, this policy issue needs to be addressed.

AB 2491 does not guarantee that a community wishing to incorporate will become a city. In order to incorporate, local communities have to overcome many hurdles, including compliance with state LAFCo policies, negotiations with counties, and ultimately a public vote. This bill gives communities considering incorporation the same opportunity to incorporate that other California cities have previously had. See attached fact sheet on the bill for more information.

#### AB 2258 (Caballero)

Sponsored by CALAFCO, AB 2258 establishes a funding program to provide grants to LAFCos for conducting in-depth studies and analyses of local government agencies and services for the purposes of creating improved efficiencies in the delivery of local government services and completing the dissolution of inactive special districts. The grant program would be administered by the Strategic Growth Council and sunset on December 31, 2023. This bill is seeking one-time grant funding for LAFCos as a follow up to the Little Hoover Commission report. It also calls for reimbursement for the mandatory dissolution of inactive districts pursuant to SB 448 (2017, Wieckowski). CALAFCO is requesting support even if individual LAFCos do not intend to apply for the grants; this is a critical piece of legislation for LAFCos and those that will apply for the funding.

#### <u>AB 3254</u>

This annual Omnibus bill includes technical changes to the Act which governs the work of LAFCos. These changes are necessary as Commissions implement the Act and small inconsistencies are found or clarifications are needed to make the law as unambiguous as possible. AB 3254 currently makes minor technical corrections to language used in the Act.

Sponsored by CALAFCO, the bill establishes a funding program to provide grants to LAFCos for conducting in-depth studies and analyses of local government agencies and services for the purposes of creating improved efficiencies in the delivery of local government services and completing the dissolution of inactive special districts. The grant program would be administered by the Strategic Growth Council and sunset on December 31, 2023. The Legislature established LAFCos in 1963 to encourage the orderly formation of local government agencies. Since that time, the regulatory role and responsibilities of LAFCos has substantially increased without additional funding. Operating in all 58 California

counties, LAFCos are responsible for meeting important statutory directives to maintain orderly boundaries and seek greater efficiencies in delivering local services, and yet these directives often times cannot be met under current funding mechanisms. As a result, much needed LAFCo activities are sometimes delayed or rejected.

In August 2017, the Little Hoover Commission published a report on special districts and their oversight by LAFCos, which contained several recommendations directly related to LAFCo. One recommendation was for the Legislature to provide one-time grant funding to pay for specified LAFCo activities, particularly to incentivize LAFCos or smaller special districts to develop and implement dissolution or consolidation plans with timelines for expected outcomes.

By establishing this one-time grant funding, AB 2258 provides an additional tool for LAFCos to conduct detailed studies and implement greater efficiencies in delivering local services based on local circumstances and conditions. For these reasons, Mendocino LAFCo is pleased to support AB 2258.

**AB 2491** by no means guarantees that a community wishing to incorporate will become a city. In order to incorporate, local communities have to overcome many hurdles, including compliance with state LAFCo policies, negotiations with counties, and ultimately a public vote. This bill simply gives communities considering incorporation the same opportunity to incorporate that other California cities have previously had.

Reinstating revenues for incorporations provides communities with local governance and efficient service delivery options, including the ability to incorporate. The inability to do so creates a tremendous detriment to the creation of logical development boundaries and to the prevention of urban sprawl. Because *AB 2491* reinstates a critical funding component to cities incorporating after 2017, Mendcocino LAFCo supports this bill.
